Analyzing claims of eco-friendliness and ensuring they are backed by genuine practices. Promoting responsible consumerism. Encouraging students to think critically about packaging and its impact on the environment.

3 Cultural Sensitivity: Cereal box designs can reflect cultural biases and stereotypes. This includes representation and diversity. Analyzing the portrayal of gender, race, and ethnicity in cereal box designs and encouraging diverse representation. Cultural appropriation. Digital resources like design templates and images. Optional: Camera, projector, digital presentation software.

Activity 1: Cereal Box Deconstruction

- 1 Brainstorm: Start with a class discussion about the role of cereal boxes in marketing and advertising. Ask students about their favorite cereal boxes and what makes them appealing.
- 2 Observation: Divide students into small groups and distribute different cereal boxes to each group. Encourage them to closely examine the elements of the design.

- 2 Sketching: Students individually sketch their cereal box design.
