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inside interviewing highlights the fluctuating and diverse moral worlds put into place during interview research when gender race culture and other subject positions are brought narratively to the foreground it explores the facts thoughts feelings and perspectives of respondents and

a cross disciplinary volume that combines and puts into dialogue perspectives on disasters this book includes contributions from anthropology history cultural studies sociology and literary studies offering a rich and diverse set of arguments and analyses on the ever relevant theme of catastrophe in the circum caribbean it will encourage debate and collaboration between scholars working on disasters from a range of disciplinary perspectives

drawing on extensive interviews with ninety four women prisoners megan sweeney examines how incarcerated women use available reading materials to come to terms with their pasts negotiate their present experiences and reach toward different futures foregrounding the voices of african american women sweeney analyzes how prisoners read three popular genres narratives of victimization urban crime fiction and self help books she outlines the history of reading and education in u s prisons highlighting how the increasing dehumanization of prisoners has resulted in diminished prison libraries and restricted opportunities for reading although penal officials have sometimes endorsed reading as a means to control prisoners sweeney illuminates the resourceful ways in which prisoners educate and empower themselves through reading given the scarcity of counseling and education in prisons women use books to make meaning from their experiences to gain guidance and support to experiment with new ways of being and to maintain connections with the world

katherine mansfield had a career long engagement with the literary marketplace from the age of eighteen this book examines how she developed as a writer within a range of book and periodical publishing contexts reconsidering her writing s enactment of a commercially viable modern aesthetic in her experimentation with the short story form

sound positions individuals as social subjects the presence of human beings animals objects or technologies reverberates into the spaces we inhabit and produces distinct soundscapes that render social practices group associations and socio cultural tensions audible the acoustics of the social on page and screen unites interdisciplinary perspectives on the social dimensions of sound in audiovisual and literary environments the essays in the collection discuss soundtracks for shared values group membership and collective agency and engage with the subversive functions of sound and sonic forms of resistance in american literature film and tv

differences in performance between students living in poverty and more advantaged students are reflective of an opportunity gap as opposed to a gap in student ability this book argues that significant attention must be given to eliminating the barriers that produce educational inequities in student achievement walker dalhouse and risiko focus on disparities in literacy achievement that might be attributed to color blind practices deficit mindsets low expectations or context neutral practices situating literacy learning within a comprehensive view of literacy development they provide a set of instructional practices that will best support students living in poverty specifically vignettes from kindergarten through middle school classrooms are used to demonstrate practices that address critical areas of the reading process are responsive to students racial ethnic cultural gender and linguistic histories and assets attend to students strengths and needs and go beyond short term gains on high stakes tests to support optimal and sustainable learning educators and school leaders can use this resource to transform schools into nurturing and

vibrant communities that are committed to change equity and diversity book features provides recommendations and detailed guidance for enacting literacy instruction that will close opportunity gaps for students living in poverty includes vignettes from leading literacy educators and researchers including elizabeth baker susan cantrell jill lewis spector allison skerrett and kelly wissman demonstrates high quality literacy instruction implemented in k 8 classrooms presents instruction that is responsive to differences and honors the languages literacies and cultural resources that students bring to their learning offers specific recommendations and practices that can guide advocacy for change

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
