cross cultural differences have many important implications for social identity social cognition and interpersonal behavior the 10th volume of the ontario symposia on personality and social psychology focuses on east west cultural differences and similarities and how this research can be applied to cross cultural studies in general culture and social behavior covers a range of topics from differences in basic cognitive processes to broad level cultural syndromes that pervade social arrangements laws and public representations leading researchers in the study of culture and psychology describe their work and their current perspective on the important questions facing the field pioneers in the field such as harry triandis and michael bond present their work along with those who represent some newer approaches to the study of culture richard e nisbett concludes the book by discussing the historical development of the field and an examination of which aspects of culture are universal and which are culture specific by illustrating both the diversity and vitality of research on the psychology of culture and social behavior the editors hope this volume will stimulate further research from psychologists of many cultural traditions understanding cultural differences is now more important than ever due to their potential to spark conflict violence and aggression as such this volume is a must have for cultural researchers including those in social cultural and personality psychology and interpersonal cultural and political communication anthropology and sociology

the book presents a new theory of the relationship between language and culture in a transnational and global perspective the fundamental view is that languages spread across cultures and cultures spread across languages or in other words that linguistic and cultural practices flow through social networks in the world along partially different paths and across national structures and communities

between 1700 and 1830 men and women in the english speaking territories framing the atlantic gained unprecedented access to material things the british atlantic was an empire of goods held together not just by political authority and a common language but by a shared material culture nourished by constant flows of commodities diets expanded to include exotic luxuries such as tea and sugar the fruits of mercantile and colonial expansion homes were furnished with novel goods like clocks and earthenware teapots the products of british industrial ingenuity this groundbreaking book compares these developments in britain and north america bringing together a multi disciplinary group of scholars to consider basic questions about women men and objects in these regions in asking who did the shopping how things were used and why they became the subject of political dispute the essays show the profound significance of everyday objects in the eighteenth century atlantic world

for decades political scientists studying the court have adopted behavioral approaches and focused on the relatively narrow question of how the justices policy preferences influence their voting behavior this emphasis has illuminated important aspects of supreme court politics but it has also left unaddressed many other important questions about this unique and fascinating institution drawing on the new institutionalism in the social sciences the distinguished contributors to this volume attempt to fill this gap by exploring a variety of topics including the court s institutional development and its relationship to broader political contexts such as party regimes electoral systems social movements social change legal precedents political identities and historically evolving economic structures the book s initial chapters examine the nature of the court s distinctive norms as well as the development of its institutional powers and practice a second section relates the development of supreme court politics

to the historical development of other political institutions and social movements concluding chapters explore how its decision making in particular areas of law or periods of time is influenced by and influences its socio political milieu these contributions offer provocative insights regarding the court s role in maintaining or disrupting political and economic structures as well as social structures and identities tied to ideology class race gender and sexual orientation the supreme court in american politics shows how we can develop an enriched understanding of this institution and open up exciting new areas of research by placing it in the broader context of politics in the united states

soon after its publication in 1973 fear of flying brought erica jong immense popular success and media fame alternately pegged sassy and vulgar jong s novel embraced the politics of the women s liberation movement and challenged the definition of female sexuality yet today more than twenty years and several books later literary reputation continues for the most part to elude jong typecast by her adversaries as a media seeking sensationalist erica jong has been unfairly side stepped by academia charlotte templin contends in this carefully researched study augmented by personal interviews with jong templin assembles and analyzes the medley of responses to jong s books by reviewers critics writers academics and the media by liberals conservatives and feminists she examines the diverse opinions on the merit and relevance to contemporary life of fear of flying the invocation of a high culture low culture dichotomy to discredit how to save your own life the anatomy of literary success with fanny jong s reception in a postfeminist age and the trivialization of jong s works that is inevitable with mass media exposure templin also shows how antagonistic reviewers tend to identify jong with her fictitious characters a practice more common when the author is a woman and judge her to be guilty of the sin of not being a proper woman in turn she shows how reviewers reveal something of their own values and ideological biases in their critiques and how literary reputations are built destroyed and altered over time the first book to make a detailed examination of the reputation of a woman writer feminism and the politics of literary reputation provides an excellent case study for the literary reception of women writers within a broad cultural context templin s analysis offers valuable insight into the reception of women writers especially commercially successful women writers and dramatically illustrates the relation of literary reputation to popular

appeal and cultural mores

why do america s public schools seem unable to meet today s social challenges as competing interest groups vie over issues like funding and curricula we seem to have lost sight of the democratic purposes originally intended for public education public schools were envisioned by the founders as democratically run institutions for instilling civic values but today s education system seems more concerned with producing good employees than good citizens meanwhile our country s diversity has eroded consensus about citizenship and the professionalization of educators has diminished public involvement in schools this volume seeks to demonstrate that the democratic purposes of education are not outmoded ideas but can continue to be driving forces in public education nine original articles by some of today s leading education theorists cut a broad swath across the political spectrum to examine how those democratic purposes might be redefined and revived it both establishes the intellectual foundation for revitalizing american schools and offers concrete ideas for how the educational process can be made more democratic the authors make a case for better empirical research about the politics of education in order to both reconnect schools to their communities and help educators instill citizenship an initial series of articles reexamines the original premise of american education as articulated by important thinkers like jefferson and dewey a second group identifies flaws in how schools are currently governed and offers models for change a final section analyzes the value conflicts posed by the twin strands of democratic socialization and governance and their implications for education policy spanning philosophy history sociology and political science this book brings together the best current thinking about the specifics of education

policy vouchers charter schools national testing and about the role of deliberation in a democracy it offers a cogent alternative to the exchange paradigm and shows how much more needs to be understood about an issue so vital to america s future

outlining the unwritten but deeply ingrained system of moral codes that italian immigrants brought to america bellioti examines that system in relation to moral theorists who argue we owe the most to people close to us and those who contend we must attach no special weight to our own interests when determining proper moral action he also investigates philosophical historical sociological and political aspects of government authority examines conflicting images of italian immigrant women and analyzes war and pacifism
