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the strategy of preventive medicine by geoffrey rose first published in 1993 remains a key text for anyone involved in preventive medicine rose s insights into the inextricable relationship between ill health or deviance in individuals and populations they come from have transformed our whole approach to strategies for improving health his personal and unique book based on many years research sets out the case that the essential determinants of the health of society are to

be found in its mass characteristics the deviant minority can only be understood when seen in its societal context and effective prevention requires changes which involve the population as a whole he explores the options for prevention considering them from various viewpoints theoretical and scientific sociological and political practical and ethical the applications of his ideas are illustrated by a variety of examples ranging from heart disease to alcoholism to road accidents his pioneering work focused on a population wide approach to the prevention of common medical and behavioural disorders has become the classic text on the subject this reissue brings the original text to a new generation involved in preventive medicine kay tee khaw and michael marmot retain the original text intact but have added their own perspective on the work they examine what relevance rose s ideas might have in the era of the human genome project and other major scientific advances they consider examples of how the theory might be applied and generalised in medicine and beyond and discuss what implications it holds for the future there is also an explanation of the population perspective clarifying the often confused thinking and arguments about determinants of individual cases and determinants of population incidence rose s strategy of preventive medicine will ensure that this seminal work continues to be read by future generations

this book delivers the first comprehensive development of a liberal conception of relational equality as a demand of social justice liberal egalitarian theories holding that justice requires a form of distributive equality in goods such as resources have been dominant for much of the last 50 years recently they have been subject to critique by relational egalitarians who hold that the value of equality does not primarily require that people receive equal shares of some good but that they relate as social equals unencumbered by hierarchies of power and social status

population health has recently grown from a series of loosely connected critiques of twentieth century public health and medicine into a theoretical framework with a corresponding field of research population health science its approach is to promote the public s health through improving everyday human life afford able nutritious food clean air safe places where children can play living wages etc it recognizes that addressing contemporary health challenges such as the prevalence of type 2 diabetes will take much more than good hospitals and public health departments blending philosophy of science medicine public health ethics and history this book offers a framework that explains analyses and largely endorses the features that define this relatively new field presenting a philosophical perspective valles helps to clarify what these features are and why they matter including searching for health s upstream causes in social life embracing a professional commitment to studying and ameliorating the staggering health inequities in and between populations and reforming scientific practices to foster humility and respect among the many scientists and non scientists who must work collaboratively to promote health featuring illustrative case studies from around the globe at the end of all main chapters this radical monograph is written to be accessible to all scholars and advanced students who have an interest in health from

public health students to professional philosophers

this four volume collection of over 140 original chapters covers virtually everything of interest to demographers sociologists and others over 100 authors present population subjects in ways that provoke thinking and lead to the creation of new perspectives not just facts and equations to be memorized the articles follow a theory methods applications approach and so offer a kind of one stop shop that is well suited for students and professors who need non technical summaries such as political scientists public affairs specialists and others unlike shorter handbooks demography analysis and synthesis offers a long overdue thorough treatment of the field choosing the analytical method that fits the data and the situation requires insights that the authors and editors of demography analysis and synthesis have explored and developed this extended examination of demographic tools not only seeks to explain the analytical tools themselves but also the relationships between general population dynamics and their natural economic social political and cultural environments limiting themselves to human populations only the authors and editors cover subjects that range from the core building blocks of population change fertility mortality and migration to the consequences of demographic changes in the biological and health fields population theories and doctrines observation systems and the teaching of demography the international perspectives brought to these subjects is vital for those who want an unbiased rounded overview of these complex multifaceted subjects topics to be covered population dynamics and the relationship between population growth and structure the determinants of fertility the determinants of mortality the determinants of migration historical and geographical determinants of population the effects of population on health economics culture and the environment population policies data collection methods and teaching about population studies all chapters share a common format each chapter features several cross references to other chapters tables charts and other non text features are widespread each chapter contains at least 30 bibliographic citations

the 1980s opened a discussion of the varying nature of health in different segments of the united states falling under the rubric of health disparities a great deal of research has been published demonstrating the substantial differences in health status within a population the causes of health disparities are varied and not always clear but most researchers agree that disparities are a reflection of social and economic inequities and political injustice one of the obstacles to addressing disparities is the lack of meaningful health data especially for vulnerable populations which is often nonexistent despite being a critical factor for informing health programs and policies at the local level this book provides a model for combating health disparities by describing how the authors gathered local health information engaged the community at every step of the process and created movement toward evidence based sustainable change this book describes how a landmark health survey in chicago generated dramatic data that are allowing investigators throughout the city to move from data to action

and from observation to intervention in providing a detailed description of how the community focused collection and analysis of health data can serve as an impetus for improved well being urban health is an invaluable resource for researchers community groups students and professionals

abstract a practical text explains in non technical language heart functions and how cardiovascular disease cvd develops separately detailing the major cvd risk factors smoking hypertension cholesterol and saturated fat obesity diabetics and glucose intolerance stress physical inactivity alcohol abuse guidelines are provided for aiding individuals in determining their own risk profiles effective strategies for producing a gradual change in life style that reduces cvd risks are presented information is provided on low fat low sodium and low calorie diets information on the latest findings ranging from sodium in foods and lower risk cigarettes to the possible benefits of aspirin and the role played by an individuals sex and hormones also is included wz

economic and social changes are taking place in a number of asian societies in conjunction with rapid population aging these factors make the setting an interesting and important one for a study of this nature the research has implications for future health care and policy planning in these societies the concluding chapter discusses these and provides an explication of the findings that may be considered to be anomalous to previous research
