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as television transformed american culture in the 1950s critics feared the influence of this newly pervasive mass medium on the nation's literature while many studies have addressed the rhetorical response of artists and intellectuals to mid twentieth century mass culture the relationship between the emergence of this culture and the production of novels has gone largely unexamined in a novel marketplace evan brier illuminates the complex ties between postwar mass culture and the making marketing and reception of american fiction between 1948 when television began its ascendancy and 1959 when random house became a publicly owned corporation the way american novels were produced and distributed changed considerably analyzing a range of mid century novels including paul bowles's *The Sheltering Sky* ray bradbury's *Fahrenheit 451* sloan wilson's *The Man in the Gray Flannel Suit* and grace metalious's *Peyton Place* brier reveals the specific strategies used to carve out cultural and economic space for the american novel just as it seemed most under threat during this anxious historical moment the book business underwent an improbable expansion by capitalizing on an economic boom and a rising population of educated consumers and by forming institutional alliances with educators and cold warriors to promote reading as both a cultural and political good a novel marketplace tells how the book trade and the novelists themselves successfully positioned their works as embattled holdouts against an oppressive mass culture even as publishers formed partnerships with mass culture institutions that foreshadowed the multimedia mergers to come in the 1960s as a foil for and a partner to literary institutions mass media corporations assisted in fostering the novel's development as both culture and commodity

set in england and hong kong in the 1920s the painted veil is the story of the beautiful but love starved kitty fane when her husband discovers her adulterous affair he forces her to accompany him to the heart of a cholera epidemic stripped of the british society of her youth and the small but effective society she fought so hard to attain in hong kong she is compelled by her awakening conscience to reassess her life and learn how to love the painted veil book is a beautifully written affirmation of the human capacity to grow to change and to forgive

in the 25 years since its original publication but for the lovers has acquired an underground reputation as one of the most remarkable novels about world war ii doing for the pacific war theater what joseph heller s catch 22 did for the european one set in the philippines but for the lovers depicts the survival of a cross section of filipinos during the japanese occupation and the american liberation the cast is enormous including an old man who used to wander the countryside entertaining children a young girl raped by japanese soldiers guerrilla messengers bringing word of the coming of the american army and a japanese major who views the war as the first step of the liberation of the asian people from western civilization this extraordinary novel is no less remarkable for the power and the beauty of its language than for the exotic and magical world it creates ranging from hallucinatory lyricism to documentary realism from black humor sketches to scenes of horror and degradation but for the lovers is a rich and complex exploration of language history and mythology the hardcover edition dutton 1970 was praised by the new york times book review as stunning this is the first paperback edition for which novelist robert coover has written an appreciative foreword

enquirer set in 1992 during the height of the bosnian war s reveals one of the most horrifying aspects of any war the rape and torture of civilian women by occupying forces s is the story of a bosnian woman in exile who has just given birth to an unwanted child one without a country a name a father or a language its birth only reminds her of an even more grueling experience being repeatedly raped by serbian soldiers in the women s room of a prison camp through a series of flashbacks s relives the unspeakable crimes she has endured and in telling her story timely strangely compelling and ultimately about survival depicts the darkest side of human nature during wartime

trauma narrative in taking a closer look at the protagonist narrator himself this paper argues that the protection from chaos and disorder which landow addresses is only achieved through a form of historical escapism superficially speaking graham swift's *waterland* is a novel about a history teacher who having lost his job forsakes the formal teaching of history and embarks on an extracurricular journey into his own past however upon closer examination *waterland* is more than that a novel about history itself it explores the whole mystery of history as swift himself puts it in the introduction to the novel *waterland* xv thus it is only logical that the novel prefaces its narrative with an insightful epigraph a dictionary definition of the latin word *historia* from which the english word history originates as can be seen above however said definition is ambivalent it is inherently polysemantic as judith ryan notes james acheson has likewise pointed out that the fact that *historia* can mean either history or fiction is significant for the historian and the writer of fiction must deal with similar problems in writing about the past the natural tendency of language towards proliferation of its meaning aside the epigraph leaves us with a very ambivalent concept of history which the narrative of *waterland* in its dealing with history then builds on since such a prominent theme in *waterland* the novel's representation of history has been thoroughly examined in secondary literature particularly against the theoretical background of what linda hutchinson has identified as historiographic metafiction
