attachment theory is among the most popular theories of human socioemotional development with a global research community and widespread interest this book re examines the work of key laboratories that have contributed to the study of attachment along with the individuals who have contributed to its intellectual development

ethological attachment theory is a landmark of 20th century social and behavioral sciences theory and research this new paradigm for understanding primary relationships across the lifespan evolved from john bowlby s critique of psychoanalytic drive theory and his own clinical observations supplemented by his knowledge of fields as diverse as primate ethology control systems theory and cognitive psychology by the time he had written the first volume of his classic attachment and loss trilogy mary d salter ainsworth s naturalistic observations in uganda and baltimore and her theoretical and descriptive insights about maternal care and the secure base phenomenon had become integral to attachment theory patterns of attachment reports the methods and key results of ainsworth s landmark baltimore longitudinal study following upon her naturalistic home observations in uganda the baltimore project yielded a wealth of enduring benchmark results on the nature of the child s tie to its primary caregiver and the importance of early experience it also addressed a wide range of conceptual and methodological issues common to many developmental and longitudinal projects especially issues of age appropriate assessment quantifying behavior and comprehending individual differences in addition ainsworth and her students broke new ground clarifying and defining new concepts demonstrating the value of the ethological methods and insights about behavior today

this chronologically organized text has an applied focus and is intentionally selective in the topics it includes so that the full text can be managed within one semester it assumes no prior

psychology exposure making it perfect for students of nursing social work and education in addition to psychology but it does not attempt to address in depth those issues covered extensively in introductory psychology courses rather the text reflects the field of human development in its current state with emphasis on developmental processes and their explanations the research base of the text is current and solid and the book emphasizes depth of content over research process

this comprehensive and integrated text provides students with a broad overview of the field of human development covering the entire range of human life from the moment of conception through death and focusing on physical cognitive and social and personality development it covers basic theories and research findings as well as highlighting current applications outside the laboratory

the attachment bond that develops between infant and mother is the first of many intimate relationships we form throughout life and as such it has been the focus of much research but how does the quality of the secure base phenomena that defines this bond vary among individuals and across cultures what methods can be used to assess its presence and characteristics following an interview with Mary S. Ainsworth the originator of the concept of secure base this new monograph brings together eleven papers that consolidate our understanding of the empirical advances that have occurred in attachment research the collection is organized into three sections part one includes papers on the generalizability of

attachment theory and data including cross cultural research part two addresses both normative and individual differences among mothers children caregivers and their interactions and methods for the valid assessment of these part three examines the mental representations that children use to depict their different attachment relationships together these papers will stimulate child development specialists and students to explore different assessment methods and to move beyond current understandings of attachment

this study presents contemporary issues in child development featuring vignettes which narrate the lives of three fictionalized families and tell the story of development integrative themes and section summaries tie together basic concepts research and developmental principles

this text uses a chronological organization to teach principles of development through childhood and encourages readers to reflect on their own personal experience of development a brief paperback version of exploring child development the authors goal was to address the need for a book that actually showed the child in the context of human relationships children do not develop in a vacuum as the process of development is shaped by the continuous interplay between individuals and their ever changing environments to illustrate the uniqueness of these individuals and environments the authors have integrated examples of diversity throughout the text in the domains of physical psychological and cultural differences gender race ethnicity and social and economic status

drawing heavily on infancy research conducted over the past 25 years fogel provides a scientifically based account of infant development chronologically organized the text covers similar topics in each chapter including motor and physical development perceptual and cognitive development and social and language development fogel also stresses the practical applications of the theories and research presented through in text features including family and society co regulating with baby and awareness through movement a new icon identifies topics that can be augmented by searching the world wide

combining research and practice this text creates a comprehensive look at a child's development from conception through adolescence a topical organization is featured which reinforces core concepts and research that is balanced with applications centred around real life situations also included is a chapter which reviews atypical development helpful boxes that amplify chapter material and a summary chapter which reviews child development by age rather than by topic the seventh edition emphasizes the role of culture in development thereby offering a wide ranging contemporary assessment of child development

caregiving role rather than gender has a predominant influence on parent interaction in nonstressful as well as stressful situations primary caregiving fathers can competently assume caregiving and nurturant functions so as to become their infants primary attachment figures based on videotaped home observations dr geiger examines the unique and interactive effects of the gender of the caregiver and the primacy of the caregiver role on parent infant interaction dr geiger observed 56 parents of different gender father mother and caregiving role primary secondary interacting with their infant in a non stressful situation then infants were placed under stress in a modified version of the strange situation a gender x caregiving role analysis of variance indicated no gender or role effect for parents and infants affiliative behaviors under nonstressful conditions except for fathers rough tumble play a caregiving role and or a gender x role interaction effect was observed on the attachment behaviors of parents caregiving and displaying affection and of infants displaying affection clinging moving away and exploring infants play interaction was most synchronous with that of primary caregiving fathers finally the caregiver role effect indicated on all infants attachment behaviors under stress showed a distinctive preference for primary caregivers fathers or mothers with disregard for gender dr geiger's study indicates that primary caregiving fathers can be as competent as primary and secondary caregiving mothers they were more affectionate and despite an increased amount of assumed caregiving and household chores primary caregiving fathers were more involved and in greater synchrony with their infant's play activities than primary or secondary caregiving mothers this

study challenges sex role stereotypes and suggests benefits of modeling a more egalitarian upbringing it presents strategies to resolve the dilemma of day care for infants this book will be of great interest to students scholars and other researchers involved with early childhood education socioemotional development of children and developmental psychology especially once it is acknowledged that father care in the home for infants less than one year of age has become the most common form of primary nonmaternal care arrangement 21 6 adopted by employed mothers

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
