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the literary career of Friedrich Nietzsche 1844 1900 spanned less than twenty years but no area of intellectual inquiry was left untouched by his iconoclastic genius the philosopher who announced the death of God in The Gay Science 1882 and went on to challenge the Christian code of morality in Beyond Good and Evil 1886 grappled with the fundamental issues of the human condition in his own intense autobiography Ecce Homo 1888 most notorious of all perhaps his idea of the triumphantly transgressive Übermensch Superman is developed in the extreme yet poetic words of Thus Spoke Zarathustra 1883 92 whether addressing conventional Western philosophy or breaking new ground Nietzsche vastly extended the boundaries of nineteenth century thought

The Nietzsche Disappointment examines the workings of time in Nietzsche's philosophy. It asks how he explains the great changes that, according to him, turned the past into the present: catastrophic transformations of morality, language, human nature, or that may yet make a desirable future out of this sorry present age. The question is essential: Nietzsche attacks morality by appeal to the past and future, where philosophy had fancied itself eternal, imagining all times to be more or less like the present. Nietzsche sets the subject in motion with his attention to abrupt, utterly consequential events: everything eternal becomes temporal. But after whetting his readers' appetites for past and future cataclysms, Nietzsche makes them seem impossible. Birth of tragedy raises the question of where Socrates could have come

from and then can't answer in *beyond good and evil* Nietzsche pins his hopes on the birth of future philosophers even as he shows how many obstacles prevent their being born on the *genealogy of morals* posits occurrences like the triumph of slave morality that violate Nietzsche's own claims about what can happen what stops Nietzsche from telling the very stories that he wanted philosophy to attend to perhaps that question can't be answered without considering how Nietzsche understands his own place in the flow of time considering for instance his wish to be an original philosopher the Nietzsche disappointment is both critical and sympathetic it interrogates Nietzsche in terms that he should understand it closes by asking whether there is some way of being critical that is also self-critical for then a good reading may free the reader from Nietzsche's person while continuing to confront the challenge he bequeathed to philosophy

the theme of the philosopher as therapist dominates Nietzsche's entire opus from his earliest writings to the *Zarathustra* period and beyond Nietzsche wishes to hasten the coming and future sanctification of a new type of synthetic human being and his entire teaching is shaped by his own struggles against illness yet few Nietzsche scholars have paid this crucial therapeutic element of his thought sufficient attention this collection of essays by leading scholars in the field is composed around the Nietzschean insight which has its roots in the Hippocratic tradition of ancient medicine that beliefs, behaviours, ideals and patterns of striving are not things for which individuals or even cultures are responsible rather they are symptoms of what an individual or culture is which symptoms require diagnostic interpretation and evaluation the book identifies three principal approaches in Nietzsche's philosophy diagnostic, prognostic and therapeutic each essay takes up this essential insight into Nietzsche's therapeutic philosophy from a different perspective and collectively they reveal an array of insightful approaches to self-induced enhancement for both individuals and cultures

an introduction to literary theory unlike any other ten lessons in theory engages its readers with three fundamental premises the first premise is that a genuinely productive understanding of theory depends upon a considerably more sustained

encounter with the foundational writings of hegel marx nietzsche and freud than any reader is likely to get from the introductions to theory that are currently available the second premise involves what fredric jameson describes as the conviction that of all the writing called theoretical lacan's is the richest entertaining this conviction the book pays more and more careful attention to the richness of lacan's writing than does any other introduction to literary theory the third and most distinctive premise of the book is that literary theory isn't simply theory about literature but that theory fundamentally is literature after all ten lessons in theory argues and even demonstrates that theoretical writing is nothing if not a specific genre of creative writing a particular way of engaging in the art of the sentence the art of making sentences that make trouble sentences that make or desire to make radical changes in the very fabric of social reality as its title indicates the book proceeds in the form of ten lessons each based on an axiomatic sentence selected from the canon of theoretical writing each lesson works by creatively unpacking its featured sentence and exploring the sentence's conditions of possibility and most radical implications in the course of exploring the conditions and consequences of these troubling sentences the ten lessons work and play together to articulate the most basic assumptions and motivations supporting theoretical writing from its earliest stirrings to its most current turbulences provided in each lesson is a working glossary specific critical keywords are boldfaced on their first appearance and defined either in the text or in a footnote but while each lesson constitutes a precise explication of the working terms and core tenets of theoretical writing each also attempts to exemplify theory as a practice of creativity foucault in itself

dead letters to nietzsche examines how writing shapes subjectivity through the example of nietzsche s reception by his readers including stanley rosen david farrell krell georges bataille laurence lampert pierre klossowski and sarah kofman more precisely joanne faulkner finds that the personal identification that these readers form with nietzsche s texts is an enactment of the kind of identity formation described in lacanian and kleinian psychoanalysis this investment of their subjectivity guides their understanding of nietzsche s project the revaluation of values not only does this work make a provocative contribution to nietzsche scholarship but it also opens in an original way broader philosophical questions about how readers come to be invested in a philosophical project and how such investment alters their subjectivity

the saints are good company they are the heroes of the faith who blazed new and creative paths to holiness they are the witnesses whose testimonies echo throughout the ages in the memory of the church most christians and particularly catholics are likely to have their own favorite saints those who inspire and speak to believers as they pray and struggle through the challenges of their own lives leonard delorenzo s book addresses the idea of the communion of saints rather than individual saints

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Introduction

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
