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there are few terms or concepts that have in the last twenty or so years rivaled collective memory for attention in the humanities and social sciences indeed use of the term has extended far beyond scholarship to the realm of politics and journalism where it has appeared in speeches at the centers of power and on the front pages of the world's leading newspapers the current efflorescence of interest in memory however is no mere passing fad it is a hallmark characteristic of our age and a crucial site for understanding our present social political and cultural conditions scholars and others in numerous fields have thus employed the concept of collective memory sociological in origin to guide their inquiries into diverse though allegedly connected phenomena nevertheless there remains a great deal of confusion about the meaning origin and implication of the term and the field of inquiry it underwrites the collective memory reader presents organizes and

evaluates past work and contemporary contributions on the questions raised under the rubric of collective memory combining seminal texts hard to find classics previously untranslated references and contemporary landmarks it will serve as an essential resource for teaching and research in the field in addition in both its selections as well as in its editorial materials it suggests a novel life story for the field one that appreciates recent innovations but only against the background of a long history in addition to its major editorial introduction which outlines a useful past for contemporary memory studies the collective memory reader includes five sections precursors and classics history memory and identity power politics and contestation media and modes of transmission memory justice and the contemporary epoch comprising ninety one texts in addition to the essay introducing the entire volume a brief editorial essay introduces each of the sections while brief capsules frame each of the 91 texts

a friend of mine asked me to accompany him to visit a young woman in her twenties named kayitesi at the time in april 2007 kayitesi lived in rural kigali with two siblings kayitesi s parents and many of her relatives were killed during the genocide perpetrated against the tutsi in rwanda in 1994 the genocide took place in the central and eastern african country of rwanda when radical hutu youth militias and hutu political elites targeted and killed the tutsi for about three months between april and july the hutus and some foreigners who protected the tutsi or opposed the genocidal violence were also killed

how does cajun literature emerging in the 1980s represent the dynamic processes of remembering in cajun culture known for its hybrid constitution and deeply ingrained oral traditions cajun culture provides an ideal testing ground for investigating the collective memory of a group in particular francophone and anglophone cajun texts by such writers as jean arceneaux tim gautreaux jeanne castille zachary richard ron thibodeaux darrell bourque and kirby jambon reveal not only a shift from an oral to a written tradition they also show hybrid perspectives on the cajun collective memory based on recurring references to place the texts also reflect on the acadian past and reveal the innate ability of the cajuns to adapt through repeated intertextual references the cajun collective memory is thus defined by a transnational outlook a transversality cutting across various ethnic heritages to establish and legitimize a collective identity both amid the linguistic and cultural diversity in louisiana and in the face of american mainstream culture cajun literature and cajun collective memory represents the first analysis of the mnemonic strategies cajun writers use to explore and sustain the cajun identity and collective

in the fields of literary and memory studies the cultural impact of the bosnian war of 1992 1995 appears despite the scale of devastation somewhat minimal reading war making memory focuses on how authors from the diaspora of the former yugoslavia have transmitted and translated the realities of the war in their fiction illuminating how these texts interpolate the culture and memory of bosnia herzegovina into an act of mnemonic migration drawing from close readings studies of public reception and focus group interviews this volume explores the attempt to reshape social frameworks of memory and the wider reception and impact of memory making literature across europe

this book offers a critical examination of certain ideas and values such as remembering forgiveness story telling through truth and reconciliation commissions etc that under gird the transitional practices and mechanisms of societies emerging from conflicts it does so by making the survivors experience the supreme and ultimate judge of the legitimacy of such practices while many scholars have dealt with these topics this book provides a unique perspective on them by using personal stories narratives and memoirs of the survivors as a checking point of the theoretical elaboration of these ideas and values by means of an existential phenomenological analysis of the situation of survivors of gross human rights violations the book assesses how many resources are still available to them so that they can contribute to the processes of reconstruction and reconciliation of their societies this analysis constitutes the background for reading the rest of the book which challenges some assumptions and presumptions of transitional practices such as healing through truth telling or providing justice through reparations it does so by presenting nuanced suggestions on the ways survivors can participate in the reconstruction reconciliation processes without jeopardizing their own well being

for those who study memory there is a nagging concern that memory studies are inherently backward looking and that memory itself hinders efforts to move forward unhinging memory from the past this book brings together an interdisciplinary group of prominent scholars who bring the future into the study of memory

offers readers an introduction to just under 30 critical and representative writings on the relationship between film and history these writings represent a combination of insights from film theory cultural studies historiography the history of cinema and film promotion and reception
