Clare James's *The Black Jacobins* remains one of the great works of the twentieth century and the cornerstone of Haitian revolutionary studies. In *Making the Black Jacobins*, Rachel Douglas traces the genesis, transformation, and afterlives of James's landmark work across the decades from the 1930s on, examining the 1938 and 1963 editions of *The Black Jacobins*, the 1967 play of the same name, and James's 1936 play *Toussaint Louverture*, as well as manuscripts, notes, interviews, and other texts. Douglas shows how James continuously rewrote and revised his history of the Haitian revolution as his politics and engagement with Marxism evolved. She also points to the vital significance theater played in James's work and how it influenced his views of history. Douglas shows *The Black Jacobins* to be a palimpsest, its successive layers of rewriting renewing its call to new generations.

Reading Shakespeare through drama arises out of case study research which focuses on reading as a socio-cultural practice underpinned by theories of reading, learning, drama, and play. It is nevertheless rooted in the everyday work of secondary English classrooms utilising the dialogic ambiguities inherent in Shakespeare's playscripts. This collaborative approach to reading pays particular attention to adolescent readers as meaning makers and cultural producers. The authors examine different iterations of active Shakespeare pedagogies in the UK, the USA, and Australia, drawing a distinction between reading through drama as an approach and the theatre-inflected practices promoted by well-known arts-based institutions. Observational and interview data highlight the importance of addressing issues concerning identity and representation that are inevitably raised by the study of canonical literature. Importantly, this element situates teachers' practice within broader ideological contexts at institutional and national policy level, particularly from the perspective of England's highly regulated system of schooling.

This work provides a wealth of information on obscure and overlooked American playwrights as well as some famous ones. It will be a welcome addition for collections specializing in the theater arts. Reference books bulletin. This directory and index, the first such volume devoted exclusively to contemporary Black American dramatists, will have an important place in theatre collections. It captures and preserves an elusive part of artistic endeavor, giving access to literally thousands of dramatic works that would otherwise be lost to scholars and the public. Organized as an encyclopedia, it provides information on more than 600 noteworthy Black American playwrights whose plays have been written, produced, or published between 1950 and the present. The volume begins with an introductory essay surveying the history of contemporary Black American drama. Playwrights, screenwriters, radio and television scriptwriters, and musical theatre collaborators are treated in individual entries that comprise the bulk of the book. The volume also supplies a bibliography of anthologies, books, and periodicals cited, mailing addresses for more than 200 of the playwrights, and title and subject indexes.

One of the most important plays of the twentieth century, *A Streetcar Named Desire*

revolutionised the modern stage this book offers the first continuous history of the play in production from 1947 to 1998 with an emphasis on the collaborative achievement of tennessee williams elia kazan and jo mierziner in the broadway premiere from there chapters survey major national premieres by the world's leading directors including those by sekai sano mexico luchino visconti italy ingmar bergman sweden jean cocteau france and laurence olivier england philip kolin also evaluates key english language revivals and assesses how the script evolved and adapted to cultural changes interpretations by black and gay theatre companies also receive analyses and transformations into other media such as ballet film television and opera premiered in 1998 form an important part of the overall study

this book offers the first major discussion of metatheatre in australian drama of the late twentieth and early twenty first centuries it highlights metatheatre's capacity to illuminate the wider social cultural and artistic contexts in which plays have been produced drawing from existing scholarly arguments about the value of considering metatheatre holistically this book deploys a range of critical approaches combining textual and production analysis archival research interviews and reflections gained from observing rehearsals focusing on four plays and their australian productions the book uses these examples to showcase how metatheatre has been utilised to generate powerful elements of critique particularly of indigenous non indigenous relations it highlights metatheatre's vital place in australian dramatic and theatrical history and connects this australian tradition to wider concepts in the development of contemporary theatre this illuminating text will be of interest to students and scholars of australian theatre historic and contemporary as well as those researching and studying drama and theatre studies more broadly

in early twentieth century motion picture houses offensive stereotypes of african americans were as predictable as they were prevalent watermelon eating chicken thievery savages with uncontrollable appetites sambo and zip coon were all representations associated with african american people most of these caricatures were rendered by whites in blackface few people realize that from 1915 through 1929 a number of african american film directors worked diligently to counter such racist definitions of black manhood found in films like d w griffith's the birth of a nation the 1915 epic that glorified the ku klux klan in the wake of the film's phenomenal success african american filmmakers sought to defend and redefine black manhood through motion pictures gerald butters's comprehensive study of the african american cinematic vision in silent film concentrates on works largely ignored by most contemporary film scholars african american produced and directed films and white independent productions of all black features using these race movies to explore the construction of masculine identity and the use of race in popular culture he separates cinematic myth from historical reality the myth of the euro american controlled cinematic portrayal of black men versus the actual black male experience through intense archival

research butters reconstructs many lost films expanding the discussion of race and representation beyond the debate about good and bad imagery to explore the construction of masculine identity and the use of race as device in the context of western popular culture he particularly examines the filmmaking of oscar micheaux the most prolific and controversial of all african american silent film directors and creator of the recently rediscovered within our gates the legendary film that exposed a virtual litany of white abuses toward blacks black manhood on the silent screen is unique in that it takes contemporary and original film theory applies it to the distinctive body of african american independent films in the silent era and relates the meaning of these films to larger political social and intellectual events in american society by showing how both white and black men have defined their own sense of manhood through cinema it examines the intersection of race and gender in the movies and offers a deft interweaving of film theory american history and film history

contains thirty five alphabetically arranged essays that provide career biographies of african american dramatists and prose writers active since 1955 each with a list of principal works and a bibliography includes additional articles that discuss specific aspects of the african american theater

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
