this work describes the grammar of gayogo hó ncc gayogo hó ncc néha c cayuga an cgwehc weh iroquoian language spoken at six nations ontario canada topics include gayogo hó ncc morphology word formation pronominal prefix selection meaning and pronunciation syntax fixed word order and discourse the effects of free word order and noun incorporation and the use of particles gayogo hó ncc néha c morphophonology and sentence level phonology are also described where relevant in the grammar finally the work includes noun verb and particle dictionaries organized according to the categories outlined in the grammatical description as well as lists of cultural terms and phrases

a grammar of tshangla is the first major linguistic description of tshangla a tibeto burman language spoken in bhutan northeast india and southwest china written from a functional typological perspective it contains a wealth of illustrative examples both from elicited data and from spontaneously generated texts it is a truly comprehensive description including sections on phonology lexicon morphophonemics morphosyntactic structure clause concatenating constructions as well as discourse pragmatic features the volume will be of interest to language students and to linguists and ethnographic scholars seeking to understand the bhutanese and south asian linguistic situation the large amount of raw language data presented here make this grammar of tshangla an indispensable tool for students of tibeto burman comparative linguistics and morphosyntactic theory in general

this is a comprehensive reference grammar of tariana an endangered arawak language from a remote region in the northwest amazonian jungle its speakers traditionally marry someone speaking a different language and as a result most people are fluent in five or six languages because of this rampant multilingualism tariana combines a number of features inherited from the protolanguage with properties diffused from neighbouring but unrelated tucanoan languages typologically unusual features of the language include an array of classifiers independent of genders complex serial verbs case marking depending on the topicality of a noun and double marking of case and of number tariana has obligatory evidentiality every sentence contains a special element indicating whether the information was seen heard or inferred by the speaker or whether the speaker acquired it from somebody else this grammar will be a valuable source book for linguists and others interested in natural languages

according to chomsky to learn a language is to develop a grammar for it a generative grammar which assigns a definite structure and a definite meaning to each of a definite set of sentences this forms the speaker's linguistic competence which represents a distinct faculty of the mind called the faculty of language this view has been widely criticised from many separate angles and by many different authors including some of chomsky's pupils as one of the earliest and most persistent critics professor matthews is especially well placed to tie these arguments together he concludes that chomsky's notion of competence finds no support within linguistics it can be defended if at all only by assuming a

traditional philosophy of mind the notion of grammar should therefore be restricted to descriptive linguistics and should not have psychological interpretations foisted on it peter matthews book covers a variety of topics from morphology to speech acts from word meaning to the study of language variation and from blending in syntax to the relation of language and culture this wide range of subject matter is incisively handled in a style which is both elegant and economical

grammar is a subject that even the best english users tend to neglect this book can be used as a general reference book by all for students it is a grammar guide to refer to any topic at a glance the description of every rule is easily understandable without teachers help it covers all the grammar rules for day to day requirements and all parts of speech with plenty of examples the pronouns are very well explained especially nominative and objective pronouns which are often confusing for many the case is similar with verbs and adverbs

this study continues the adaptation of the method of case frame analysis for the investigation of the greek text of the new testament case frame analysis distinguishes the words of a language into two categories predicators words that require completion by other words for their correct grammatical use and non predicators words that do not require such completion and provides rigorous procedures for describing the syntactic semantic and lexical requirements that predicators impose on the words that complete their meaning the inclusion of semantic function and feature descriptions in case frame analysis permits the development of a new genre of lexicon that specifies not only syntactic and lexical information as do traditional dictionaries but detailed semantic information the resulting case frame lexicon entries are both more compact and more nuanced than traditional lexicon entries danove conducts an exhaustive case frame analysis of the ditransitive verbs of transference in the new testament he uses this analysis to develop a set of descriptive guidelines for interpreting and translating the various usages of ditransitive verbs of transference and applies these rules in exegetical studies of the text of the new testament to generate a case frame lexicon of the verbs of transference in the new testament this study will distinguish the requirements of the 127 new testament verbs of transference according to four syntactic functions twelve semantic functions and 22 lexical realizations this will permit a rigorous investigation of all occurrences of verbal complements with the same syntactic semantic and lexical attributes the study also will consider the influence of one semantic feature an inherent quality of words that has implications for their lexical realization and of the intrusion of four grammatical constructions inherent structuring templates of grammar that govern syntactic semantic and lexical attributes and modify meaning on each category of complements with the same syntactic semantic and lexical description this will produce a rigorous description of meaning that becomes the basis for danove s contributions to the linguistic study of biblical greek and to the exegesis of biblical texts
