img src continuumbooks com pub images impactslogo gif align left since its publication in 1968 difference and repetition an exposition of the critique of identity has come to be considered a contemporary classic in philosophy and one of deleuze s most important works the text follows the development of two central concepts those of pure difference and complex repetition it shows how the two concepts are related difference implying divergence and decentring repetition being associated with displacement and disguising the work moves deftly between hegel kierkegaard freud althusser and nietzsche to establish a fundamental critique of western metaphysics and has been a central text in initiating the shift in french thought away from hegel and marx towards nietzsche and freud

in may 1968 gilles deleuze was an established philosopher teaching at the innovative vincennes university just outside of paris felix guattari was a political militant and director of an unusual psychiatric clinic at la borde their meeting was unlikely and the two were introduced in an arranged encounter of epic consequence from that moment on deleuze and guattari engaged in a surprising productive partnership collaborating on several groundbreaking works including anti oedipus what is philosophy and a thousand plateaus francois dosse a prominent french intellectual examines the prolific if improbable relationship between two men of distinct and differing sensibilities drawing on unpublished archives and hundreds of personal interviews dosse elucidates a collaboration that lasted more than two decades underscoring the role that family and history particularly the turbulence of may 1968 played in their monumental work he also takes the measure of deleuze and guattari s posthumous fortunes and weighs the impact of their thought within intellectual academic and professional circles

the aqedah i e the story of the binding of isaac by abraham is a core text in all three abrahamic religions and has been widely discussed in judaism christianity and islam for centuries it still represents an intellectual moral and spiritual challenge for anyone who claims to be able to link morality and faith in god in a reasonably comprehensible way the contributions in this anthology address this challenge from philosophical theological and literary perspectives by considering exemplary problems epochs and authors

pertaining to all three abrahamic religions the first part contains seven contributions exploring the epistemic and or philosophical dimensions of the aqedah the second part contains nine essays on the history of the interpretation of the aqedah from israelite jewish christian and islamic perspectives the three texts in the third and final part discuss narratological issues and reflections of the problem within modern hebrew literature the volume complements and expands the existing scholarship on the subject above all through its consistently interreligious approach and the inclusion of current philosophical and literary sources and debates

poststructuralism has long been acknowledged to offer a radical critique of the foundational subject as a precursor to affirming a constituted subject its detractors have however held that the resultant position cannot offer a coherent account of agency strong version or alternatively that while it may be able to account for non subjective agency it is unable to develop a coherent explanation for subjective agency weak version somewhat strangely this issue has been largely ignored by commentators predisposed to poststructuralist thought in contrast this volume focuses on the works of judith butler cornelius castoriadis gilles deleuze jacques derrida michel foucault luce irigaray jacques lacan and catherine malabou to show that the question of the subject is a key one for many poststructuralist thinkers that they are aware of the problematic status of agency that arises from their decentering of the foundational subject and that they offer heterogeneous responses to it subjective agency and poststructuralism will therefore be an invaluable resource for researchers and advanced students interested in philosophy political theory psychoanalysis critical theory history of ideas feminist theory and cultural studies

art and politics are related through repetition both realms are structured by practices of repetition and share a common room of sens e uality aesthetics in the emphatic sense of the word it is the aesthetics and practices of repetition that reveal the relation between both realms this volume proposes to explore aesthetic and cultural phenomena that effect change in the non aesthetical realm not so much in spite but precisely because of their being mere repetitions repetition shapes art works through procedures and processes of reproduction copying depiction or reenactment as representation of the world mimetic art s relationship to the political and social world can be conceived as repetition when can mimetic works of art nonetheless become a trigger participant in or vehicle for political and social transformation how do mimetic practices as diverse as those of the research institute forensic architecture the theater of milo rau video installations with found

time is not normally visible while we often sense the events in time we overlook what marcel proust calls time in a pure state that's why in the force of time keith w faulkner shows how gilles deleuze extracts his ontology of the virtual from proust's psychological time to prove this he examines the ways these writers say we occupy time without counting it in the end he reveals not only how proust influences deleuze but how we sense time as a force as well

trauma hysteria philosophy includes two essays which investigate philosophically the psychoanalytic categories of trauma and hysteria each essay seeks a new way to understand such varied concepts as the dialectical theater and the linguistic turn media identity is an attempt to reinvestigate the concept of hysteria as a philosophical notion beginning with the roots of freud's development of the unconscious moving to bergson's concept of ontological memory and the body and utilizing deleuze's work on the virtual this essay attempts to navigate and describe the possibilities of identity in an age of ubiquitous media far from accepting a pessimistic outlook on the state of the subject this work considers the possibility of an aesthetics of hysteria turn theories of trauma in the age of linguistics explores the not so implicit relationship between the linguistic turn in critical theory and the growing field of trauma studies drawing from psychoanalysis critical theory linguistic philosophy and literature kamens discusses the ways in which language and trauma have grown increasingly interdependent hannes charén is an independent scholar writer and book designer based in brooklyn new york he has his masters in philosophy from the european graduate school and is currently a ph d candidate sarah kamens is a ph d student in media and communications at the european graduate school where she also received her m a and in clinical psychology at fordham university during the past few years she lived in palestine and israel where she conducted psychosocial research and worked in film

philosophy is textual it is written and it is read yet today much of philosophy regards itself as a kind of science sometimes reducing itself to a species of intellectual bureaucracy it is important to see these qualities as having their own aesthetic even realism is a genre the aesthetic of the empirical and the bureaucratic the aesthetic of the rhapsodic and of the clinical in each of these the genres of philosophy are as creative as they ever were they are productive of worlds not only worlds of thought but real worlds enabled by the technological and other changes that thought has envisaged this book explores genres through the history of philosophy providing new ways of thinking about philosophical writing exploring a wide range of both european and analytic philosophers
