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imagine an america where politicians governmental institutions schools new technologies and interest groups work together to promote informed engaged citizens civic education in the  
twenty first century brings together scholars from various disciplines to show how such a united states is possible today inspired by alexis de tocqueville s analysis of american democracy  
in the early 1800s this edited volume represents a multidimensional evaluation of civic education in its new and varied forms while some lament a civics crisis in america today civic  
education in the twenty first century raises hope that we can have an informed and active citizenry we find the activities of a number of politicians government institutions schools and  
interest groups as promising developments in the struggle to educate and engage americans in their democracy new technologies and new innovations in civic education have laid the  
foundation for a revitalized american civic ecology with civic education in the twenty first century we call for the united states to make these practices less isolated and more common  
throughout the county the volume is broken into three major sections first there are four chapters exploring the history and philosophical debates about civic education particularly with  
respect to its role in america s educational institutions then the second section provides seven groundbreaking inquiries into how politicians and political institutions can promote civic  
education and engagement through their routine operations as some examples this section explores how politicians through campaigns and judiciaries through community programs enhance  
civic knowledge and encourage civic engagement this section also explores how new technologies like the internet and social media are increasingly used by government institutions and  
other entities to encourage a more politically informed and engaged citizenry finally the third section contains six chapters that explore programs and practices in higher education that are  
enhancing civic education engagement and our knowledge of them from the virtual civics campus of fort hayes state to citizens academies throughout the country this section shows the  
possibilities for schools today to once again be civics actors and promoters

this book is all about stories the stories that shape our identities and how those identities shape our destinies for better or worse for good or evil in humanizing or dehumanizing ways working from the shakespearean metaphor all the world s a stage and all the men and women merely players pellegrini argues that only by understanding how our storied selves develop can we acquire the tools to modify the roles they dictate for us to play on the stage in the theater of real life the author deconstructs a wide variety of what he calls toxic dehumanizing death oriented self scripts as well as creative humanizing life oriented narratives of groups as well as individuals following the native american parable of two wolves engaged in mortal combat within us one good the other evil the fundamental premise here is that our identity determines which of our inner wolves we feed and thus which of them will prevail pellegrini maintains that what s at stake in this battle between humanity s collective inner wolves is not just the quality but the very survival of life on earth from this perspective as individual and group selves are humanizingly or dehumanizingly narratized by the way we exercise our god given free will in the choices we make so shall life be impacted throughout the world to advance the cause of detoxifying identities in our global society the author presents a rationale and program for an international grass roots social movement aimed at achieving a universal sense of belongingness to a global life system you can watch and listen to a video in which dr bob pellegrini talks about this book and why he wrote it by entering identities for life and death in the search bar at youtube com

this book presents a disturbing thesis education often through history textbooks promotes civic illiteracy and turns civic responsibility into patriotic conformity youth are taught to support a dominant elite view of international conflicts which undermines the critical abilities that are essential for citizens in a democracy expanding upon the social and educational insights of dissident theorists the author challenges the view of civic literacy put forth by such educators as william bennett and diane ravitch

the goal of this first edition was to create a reader in which the selections appealed to students for their currency and accessibility the readings chosen are accessible to first year students with the introductions and pedagogy written in a very student friendly manner

understanding democracy learning to be democratic and to value democracy are critical competencies to be developed by all americans in the present debate about what knowledge is of most worth in the public school these civic competencies are seen as second in importance only to the development of critical thinking they are typically however honored more in commencement rhetoric than in school programs or practices their actualization falls far short of their ascribed importance the authors argue that critical opportunities for democratic development occur in the day to day life of the schools it follows that all grade levels should participate in the creation of the constitution of the school and classrooms the justice structure of the school its disciplinary code norms and adjudication the policy making of the school and in the understanding of the school as a social laboratory the authors demonstrate the effectiveness of such a program by reporting some two decades of applied research on democratic schools which have realized some of these outcomes

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
