and adaptive activism joanna hearne and karrmen crey bring together a
collection of essays and interviews to highlight the voices of
powerful and important media makers from indigenous video game

this is the first book to comprehensively examine the development of english canadian cinema since 1980 previous books in english have dealt either with specific films or filmmakers with policy or with specific genres avant garde film documentary films by women etc it deals with regional and institutional questions with the new authors that are defining contemporary cinema in english canada with avant garde work and work by aboriginal people bringing together a wide variety of contributors the book deals with an enormous amount of cinema that has helped transform north american culture of the last two decades

what is american indian photography at the turn of the twentieth century edward curtis began creating romantic images of american indians and his works along with pictures by other non native photographers came to define the field yet beginning in the second half of the nineteenth century american indians themselves started using cameras to record their daily activities and to memorialize tribal members through a native lens offers a refreshing new perspective by highlighting the active contributions of north american indians both as patrons who commissioned portraits and as

photographers who created collections in this richly illustrated volume nicole dawn strathman explores how indigenous peoples throughout the united states and canada appropriated the art of photography and integrated it into their lifeways the photographs she analyzes date to the first one hundred years of the medium between 1840 and 1940 to account for native activity both in front of and behind the camera the author divides her survey into two parts part i focuses on native participants including such public figures as sarah winnemucca and red cloud who fashioned themselves in deliberate ways for their portraits part ii examines native professional semiprofessional and amateur photographers drawing from tribal and state archives libraries museums and individual collections through a native lens features photographs including some never before published that range from formal portraits to casual snapshots the images represent multiple tribal communities across native north america including the inland tlingit northern paiute and kiowa moving beyond studies of native americans as photographic subjects this groundbreaking book demonstrates how indigenous peoples took control of their own images and distinguished themselves as pioneers of photography

while indigenous media have gained increasing prominence around the world the vibrant aboriginal media world on the canadian west coast has received little scholarly attention as the first ethnography of the aboriginal media community in vancouver sovereign screens reveals the various social forces shaping aboriginal media production including community media organizations and avant garde art centers as well as the national spaces of cultural policy and media institutions kristin l dowell uses the concept of visual sovereignty to examine the practices forms and meanings through which aboriginal filmmakers tell their individual stories and those of their aboriginal nations and the intertribal urban communities in which they work she explores the ongoing debates within the community about what constitutes aboriginal media how this work intervenes in the national canadian mediascape and how filmmakers use technology in a wide range of genres including experimental media to recuperate cultural traditions and reimagine aboriginal kinship and sociality analyzing the interactive relations between this social community and the media forms it produces sovereign screens offers new insights into the on screen and off screen impacts of aboriginal media

weaving together concerns about environmental and social justice

an introductory chapter to this document discusses laying the foundations of a renewed relationship between canadians their governments the aboriginal peoples it looks at recognition of nations the treaty process lands resources a canada wide framework agreement social issues structural changes dimensions of social change and federal provincial territorial contributions the next chapter discusses economic disparities government expenditures the cost of the status quo followed by a discussion of the commission s strategy as a good investment improved economic opportunity living conditions human resources development institutional development public education is also discussed dialogue cross cultural communication
